

CARMEN Lotterywest Livestream

On Friday, 24 February at 7.30pm, Cummins Theatre hosted a free livestream of Western Australia (WA) Opera's CARMEN, live from the WACA Ground in Perth.

CARMEN is an opera written in 1875 by French composer Georges Bizet. Set in southern Spain to the backdrop of the 1820 Spanish revolution, CARMEN tells the story of a charismatic woman who charms those around her with her assertive and fiery nature; and Don José, a naïve soldier who falls in love with Carmen, and abandons everything to run away with her.

When their love turns sour, and Carmen leaves him for the wealthy and engaging toreador Escamillo, Don José turns bitter and jealous, and in the final tragic moments of the Opera, begs Carmen to come back to him. She tells him their affair is over, and that she was born free and free she will die. The opera concludes with Don José stabbing Carmen, as the crowd cheers for a bull fight in the distance.

WA Opera brought the tragic story to life on a stage with more than 150 performers, including some of Australia's finest singers, as well as tremendous local talent from the Western Australian Opera Chorus, the WAO Children's Chorus and the full might of the West Australian Symphony Orchestra. It was truly a spectacular show with fireworks and all, and the magic was not lost on screen.

It was a wonderful night out for all who attended. Many thanks to WA Opera and Lotterywest for facilitating the regional livestream and making this event at Cummins Theatre possible.

Ward and Representation Review Outcomes

In July 2022, the Hon John Carey MLA, Minister for Local Government, advised of the next steps in the reform process including the requirements for local governments to conduct a Ward and Representation Review, and to reduce the number of elected members based on population. In response, the Shire of Merredin commenced a review in December 2022. As part of this, a Discussion Paper was released to the public for a consultation period of seven weeks, in which community input was sought regarding the preferred number of elected members and communities of interest, while comments regarding ward systems were also invited.

Representation: Of the 14 submissions received, the preference for the number of Councillors was 7, which was supported by 86% of respondents. A large portion of the comments indicated that 5 elected members would not be enough to represent the diversity within the Shire, while also posing too high a workload on individuals due to the requirement for committee representation, as well as meeting and briefing attendance.

Community of Interest: Four people indicated that they thought the Shire had communities of interest. Two responses spoke of senior citizens, a third mentioned satellite towns, with the fourth respondent not providing a comment. The Discussion Paper also noted that the Shire considered if there was a way for Councillor representation to include at least 1 of the anticipated 7 Councillor positions to be held for traditional owners within the area, but no legally appropriate instrument was found to enable this to occur.

Wards: Half of the respondents to the survey said that they would be supportive of a ward system with comments indicating that the outlying farming communities within the Shire would be able to be represented more appropriately if there were wards in place. Despite the interest from the community, the Reform does not allow for Band 3 local governments to have a ward structure, and as such the Shire were unable to consider and further investigate this as a feasible option.

On consideration of the submissions received during the consultation period, Council endorsed the number of elected members be reduced from 9 to 7, while also maintaining a no ward structure. The Shire has since submitted a report to the Local Government Advisory Board detailing the findings from the review and offering a recommendation for consideration. Should this recommendation be accepted by the Minister, the reduction in councillors will be implemented over the next 2 election cycles in 2023 and 2025.

New EV Chargers Installed

The Shire is pleased to inform the community that two new Tesla EV chargers have now been installed at the Central Wheatbelt Visitor Centre. For non — Tesla vehicles, standard chargers continue to be available at the Merredin Regional Community and Leisure Centre, adjacent to the tennis courts.

Road Works - Goldfields Road

The Shire have now commenced the second portion of reconstruction works on Goldfields Road (see map below).

The road will be closed on several occasions during the works period, from the intersection of Merredin-Nungarin Road through to Crooks Road from 6.30am until 4.30pm (Monday – Saturday) until late April. Access will be provided for local traffic during any closures.

Please be advised that the Water Corporation will be completing sewer relining works in Merredin from March 2023 onwards.

An authorised contractor will soon commence work to refurbish ageing wastewater pipes in the townsite. Sewer relining uses trenchless technology to clean and refurbish existing wastewater pipes. It reduces the likelihood of blockages and extends the life of this important infrastructure by at least 30 years.

Work is scheduled to be completed by late July 2023. During this period, the contractors will generally work from Monday to Saturday between 7:00am and 5:00pm.


Night works may occasionally be required, and in this case, the Water Corporation will notify impacted residents in advance.

With the end of the Restricted Burning period on the 16 March, all Shire of Merredin residents are permitted to begin freely burning garden waste again. However, it is important to remember that burning releases toxins into the air we breathe.

As the Department of Water and Environmental Regulation advises, "Wood smoke is similar to tobacco smoke in composition and has known health impacts. These include:


- Eye, nose and throat irritation
- Increased asthma and respiratory problems
- Headaches, nausea and dizziness
- Aggravation of chronic heart and lung conditions."


There is no such thing as non-toxic smoke, even if you think you're only burning harmless garden waste, so if you're choosing to burn, please consider the following tips to burn as safely as possible.

- 1. **Recycle, compost or mulch as much as you can**. Far better to inject the goodness of green waste back into your garden!
- 2. Only burn organic matter such as green waste, paper or cardboard. Burning synthetic fabric or plastic releases particularly harmful toxins into the air

3. Follow fire safe practices such as:

- Ensure your garden hose can reach all boundaries of your garden – and have two hoses (connected to running water) if possible.
- Burn multiple smaller piles rather than one large pile.
- Have a minimum of two able bodied adults overseeing the burn.
- Ensure there is a fire break completely surrounding the area you'll be burning.
- Notify your neighbours that you'll be burning so that they have the opportunity to close their windows and bring their laundry in.
- Avoid burning if the wind speed is over 15km/hour (or anything stronger than a gentle breeze).
- Ensure that you are present for the entire burn, and that the fire is completely extinguished before you leave.
