## MERREDIN COMMUNITY COMES TOGETHER FOR ANNUAL CELEBRATION

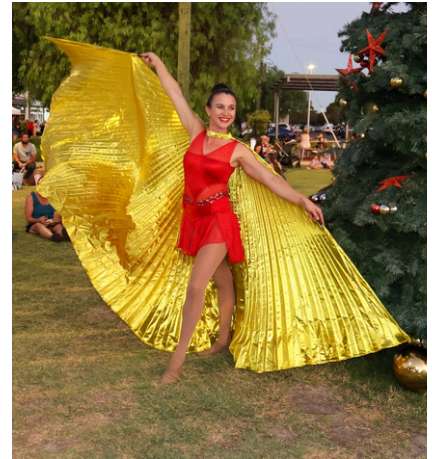
On Thursday, 18 December 2026, Merredin was alive with festive cheer at the annual Festive Night Out celebration. Residents and visitors, including many who travelled from as far as Perth, enjoyed a vibrant evening that showcased the best of Merredin's community and town centre.

The event was strongly supported by local groups and businesses, with a wide range of market stalls on offer throughout the evening. These included local first responders, arts and crafts, plants and community organisations. ## COUNCILLOR CORNER - DEPUTY SHIRE PRESIDENT RENEE MANNING

### Welcome to Councillor Corner

This new segment of the Shire's monthly community newsletter is a space for our Councillors to share their insights on what they have currently been working on, recent achievements, and looking ahead. Each month, one of the community's elected representatives will provide an update straight from Council. Today's entry is from Deputy Shire President Renee Manning.

### Greetings!

Hello and Happy New Year to my fellow Merredin residents. This marks my sixth year as a Shire of Merredin Councillor. In 2025, I was honoured to be re-elected as Deputy President. I look forward to continuing to serve the Merredin community over the next two years alongside Shire President Donna Crook, my fellow Councillors, including our newly elected Councillors, Paul Boehme and Peter Madigan.

### What We Have Been Working On

Merredin has seen a lot of change since I was first elected in 2019. Despite navigating a pandemic, changes in CEOs, and shifts around the Council table, we've managed to secure funding and deliver several significant projects. These include the Water Tower restoration, the Town Centre and Apex Park | Danjoo Waabininy Boodja projects, the community desalination pilot, the Crooks Road upgrade, the MRCLC sports resurfacing works, and Local Planning Strategy and Scheme amendments.

We've also kicked off a Business After-Hours series, welcomed new businesses into the CBD, seen trade and rural businesses grow into larger premises in Merredin's industrial area, including CBH's expansion and MacIntosh and Sons new premises. We have seen CEACA fully occupied with Merritville coming back to the Shire, and have undertaken a housing analysis to better understand local needs, and saw the Lumen University Centre Hub open. Our recreation and cultural facilities are being well used all year round, and the farming community continues to deliver record harvests, the backbone of our local economy.

Since I started on Council, my focus has been on making sure Merredin stays firmly on the radar as an important sub-regional centre. My fellow Councillors will attest that I get excited about strategic conversations on what is driving our town and broader region, and what is required to position it well for the future.

### Looking Ahead

I'm optimistic about Merredin's future, but positioning the town to take advantage of opportunities means tackling some big questions. Council continues to work through how we maintain and upgrade community infrastructure, support liveability and business growth, while also advocating for better infrastructure and services such as roads, telecommunications, health, education, and childcare. These aren't easy conversations, and they often lead to robust, yet respectful discussions around the Council table.

### How Will We Achieve This

Having our vision and goals written down is critical to keeping our eye on the prize and to help us advocate with confidence. Our new Council Plan sets out several key initiatives, including the development of a Projects and Issues Advocacy Prospectus to support cohesive and evidence-based conversations with investors and State and Federal government agencies. We recently hosted the Director General of the Department of Premier and Cabinet and have met with Water Corporation, Western Power, Nomad Energy, Collgar Wind Farm, and Main Roads in recent months to discuss these issues. I strongly believe that having a clear narrative is critical in advocating for our community and wider region.

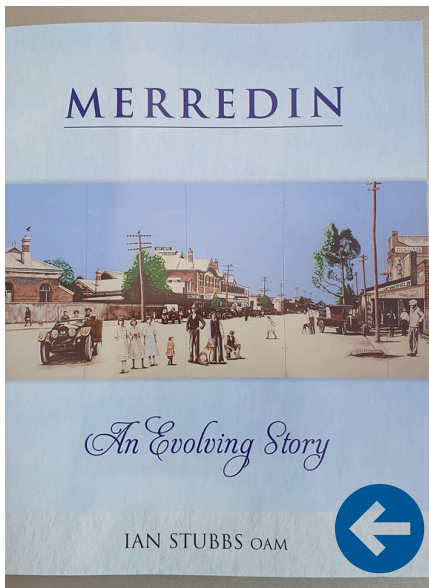
I'm particularly keen to explore how Merredin can maximise the benefits of large-scale projects being planned, including the Tandegin Wind Farm and the Ngaank Boodja Battery and Solar Farm. Our recently adopted Community Enhancement Policy will help support these projects to deliver real value — not just small community projects (that are important), but potentially training opportunities, local jobs, and supply opportunities for local businesses.

I'm genuinely excited about what lies ahead for Merredin, though there is also a lot of work to do to get us in the best position for those opportunities. I am humbled and privileged to sit at the Council table and be supported by an excellent administration (for at least the next two years).

## SHIRE UPDATES

### Hydro Pool Update

In November, a contractor was engaged to address issues with the hydrotherapy pool heating system.

Just prior to Christmas, the Shire was informed that a required part for the water heating pump is a non-standard size and is not readily available in Australia. As a result, the part must be custom-manufactured overseas.

Moving forward, the Shire will be proceeding with the manufacture of this part, which is expected to take approximately 8-12 weeks, plus delivery and installation time. Due to this, the Mini Swimmers Program (0-4 Years Swimming Lessons) will be suspended until further notice.

In addition to this, the Shire will also be engaging a contractor to undertake a comprehensive diagnostic review of the hydrotherapy pool's heating, pump, and chlorination systems to identify any underlying issues.

Historically, when issues have arisen, short-term or "band-aid" repairs have been implemented to restore operation as quickly as possible; however, these approaches have not proven practical or sustainable in the long term.

With the heater pump being offline, this presents an opportunity to undertake a thorough review of the system and identify sustainable, long-term solutions rather than continuing with temporary fixes.

Further updates will be provided once the pump part has been received and expected completion timeframes are confirmed.

### Grant Funding for Age-Friendly Initiative

In the Shire of Merredin, we believe in supporting our community at every stage of life. We are among 18 Western Australian organisations and local governments to share in \$232,000 of funding to deliver programs aimed at promoting positive aging.

With this Age-friendly Communities Connectivity grant, we established Tea & Tech; a fortnightly program where tech-savvy individuals help our senior citizens understand how to make the most of technology and stay safe while using electronic devices. These sessions aim to strengthen connections within our community, and support independent living. We'd like to express our gratitude to the Department of Communities for helping to make this initiative possible.

### Parks & Gardens

Our Reticulation Team has been diligently testing lines and adding extra water to other areas, such as the MRCLC front lawn, in anticipation of the dry months ahead. To combat damage caused to the reticulation around the tennis and hockey club, the team is hand watering with the fire trailer and a hose sprinkler. A plumber has also been actioned to undertake essential valve work at multiple sites, including near the Community Resource Centre.

Due to the age of some infrastructure, we've seen a rapid decline in wiring integrity at several locations in recent months, including the Merredin Cemetery, which has impacted our reticulation systems. Repairs are expected to take place across January, with the exploration of wireless options and taller sprinklers also underway.

After our successful Community Planting Day to install a Native Garden at Roy Little Park, a portion of reticulation was disconnected to remove another section of grass in preparation for re-planting with more natives. Other grassed areas still recovering from weed spraying will be treated with fertilizer and wetting agents once the weather starts to cool.

Thank you to our hard-working Reticulation Team for facing the rising outdoor temperatures with persistence to tackle these challenging issues.



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## FIRE SAFETY ON HOLIDAY - PART TWO

Last month we talked about different ways to maintain awareness about bushfire risk when you're away from home. This month we'll talk about ways to keep safe if you find yourself in an emergency situation away from home.

### Pack a bushfire emergency kit

If you're going on a road trip, or expect to be driving frequently in bushfire prone areas during the high threat period, it's a good idea to pack a bushfire emergency kit. Your kit should include items such as:

- ✓ AM/FM portable radio
- ✓ Spare batteries
- ✓ First aid kit
- ✓ Woollen blankets
- ✓ Drinking water
- ✓ Sturdy shoes
- ✓ Full-coverage woollen or cotton clothing
- ✓ Detailed printed map of the area you'll be travelling

### Leave early

Bushfires move fast and are unpredictable. Trying to leave when it's too late is extremely dangerous. Leaving early is the safest way for you and your family to survive a bushfire.

### Encountering a bushfire while driving

DFES offers the below advice if you become trapped by fire in your car:

If you see signs of a bushfire in the distance, like smoke or flames, carefully pull over to the side of the road to assess the situation and call triple zero. If it is safe to do so, turn around and leave the area immediately.

### If you become trapped by a fire:

- Find an area off the roadway with little or no vegetation where you can park your car. Don't park too close to other cars.
- Face your car towards the oncoming fire.
- Stay in your car. The engine may be left running so the headlights can operate and not flatten the battery.
- Turn headlights and hazard warning lights on.
- Close all doors and windows, shut air vents and turn off air conditioning.
- Get down below window level and cover your body with any woollen or cotton blankets or clothes.
- As the fire front approaches, the intensity of the heat will increase along with smoke and embers.
- Smoke gradually gets inside the car, and fumes will be released from the interior of the car. Stay close to the floor to minimise inhalation.
- Stay in the car until the fire front has passed and the temperature has dropped outside.
- Once the fire front has passed and the temperature has dropped, cautiously exit the vehicle.
- Move to a safe area, e.g. an area that has already burnt.
- Stay covered in woollen blankets and await assistance.
