Merredin District Olympic Swimming Pool	 It was suggested that large signage be installed on the highway to advertise the pool, which may increase attendance numbers 	Will discuss opening hours options with Pool Manager prior to 2018/19 season

- 6. As with a number of Council services, the Theatre runs at an annual loss of around \$200,000 meaning grant funds are crucial to the activities and events able to be provided at the Theatre
- 7. The CEO advised the financial data for the Theatre could be provided should anyone wish to obtain a copy
- 8. Maintenance of the Theatre was questioned with the suggestion it be reviewed and reduced or efficiencies identified in an effort to contain costs
- Another suggestion was made that solar panels be installed on the non-Heritage portion, however as most activity occurs at night the panels would not have the same cost effectiveness as those on other Council buildings.
- 10. Should solar battery storage efficiency improve in coming years then the panels could become a viable option
- 11. As with any service delivered by Council, consideration needs to be given to the priorities of the whole community and how to best spread the funds Council has across all its
- 12. While Council values and acknowledges the community spirit and economic benefit provided by not just the Theatre but other Council venues (i.e. Library and Visitor Centre) it is reality that monetary funds are what acquires necessary goods and services, hence why budgetary constraints are always a major consideration
- 13. The Theatre Manager advised CircuitWest had produced a guide to growing community wellbeing
